Fireside Room, St. Philip's Church Tuesday, 6 June, 2017 at 10.30 am "Pastime with Good Company" is our signature theme song. It gives a vivid expression of the enjoyment of music which we share with the singer-songwriter, an amateur like us, as well as his zest for life. The familiar "Sumer is i-cumen in" happily celebrates the arrival of summer. It is one of the oldest English songs. In "Oh mistress mine" a young man tries to persuade his girlfriend to stop looking around and live in the moment - with him. The words are Shakespeare's.

Next are four Shakespearean songs in a modern setting by Canadian composer, Kenneth Meek, an organist, harpsichordist and choral director - and no relation of Kay Meek as far we know.

Leaving songs behind, the next two works are purely instrumental. James Hook was a popular performer and composer in 18th century London, giving concerts at the main pleasure gardens and composing many stage entertainments and operas. This trio is a delightfully charming example of his work. Corelli was a leading musician in Rome in the 17th century, known both for his mastery of the violin, and as a composer. Balanced and beautiful, typified by a walking bass and crunching suspensions, his trio sonatas were famous and influential.

Dancing was an important social accomplishment at Queen Elizabeth's court. Sophisticated and cosmopolitan, the chief dances were the stately Pavane from Italy, its French companion the lively galliard, and the more moderate allmand. The pavane is a processional dance in duple time in which the dancers can show off their elegance and finery to good effect. The galliard often uses the same notes, but in triple time, keeping the dancers hopping, literally, to demonstrate their athleticism and grace. The allmand must have been a welcome chance to catch a breath at a more moderate pace.

We finish with another song, a rather jolly ditty by John Dowland who was famous for being glum.
